MIFF: More Movies Than Ever Before

ome one, come all! The 28th annual Maine International Film Festival opens tonight, Friday, July 11, and will run for ten days. Not only a chance to watch movies, the festival allows you to discuss the films not only with other movie lovers but also with the moviemakers and to travel the world without leaving the comfort of a padded, reclining seat in an air-conditioned theater.

Each year, MIFF presents a wide array of new feature films and shorts, both fiction and nonfiction, from independent producers in Maine and far beyond. The festival also hosts various filmmakers and holds retrospectives of their work.

Festival organizers boast that this year's MIFF has more movies than ever before, due in part to their having received more submissions this year than ever before. While most of the 100+ films will be premieres of some sort (e.g. Maine, New England, United States, World), the festival will also offer a

sprinkling of newly restored editions of classic films.

All screenings will take place in the three cinemas on the second floor of the Paul J. Schupf Art Center at 93 Main Street in downtown Waterville and in the adjoining, 123-year-old Waterville Opera House. Except where otherwise noted, the screenings described below will take place in the 800-seat Opera House and will start at 7:00 p.m. All quotes are from the festival's website.

The festival will open with *The Librarians*, a documentary lauding those stal-



That 68-minute documentary will be paired with "The Constituent," a new, 37-minute dramatic "short" directed by and starring Ernest Thompson. Best known as the playwright who crafted On Golden Pond, Thompson adapted "The Constituent" from his one-act play of the same name. Set and shot in New Hampshire, the film also stars Gordon Clapp, who is best known as Detective


Greg Medavoy from the 1990s police drama *NYPD Blue*.

On Tuesday, July 15, MIFF will present its Mid-Life Achievement Award to British actor Clive Owen after a screening of *Croupier* (1998), in which Owen portrays a struggling writer who takes a job in a casino and is solicited to take part in a risky robbery. MIFF will also show five of Owen's other films: *Gosford Park* (2001), *I'll Sleep When I'm Dead* (2003), *Closer* (2004), *Children of Men* (2006), and *Duplicity* (2009). Except for *Sleep*, which will screen on Monday at 3:00 p.m. in Cinema 1, the Clive Owen movies all screen on either Tuesday or Wednesday in the Opera House. Check the festival's program guide or website for times. Each film will be shown only once.

On Tuesday and Wednesday, MIFF will shine its spotlight on movies from Cambodia and Israel. From Cambodia comes *Diamond Island* (2016), a drama about the mass migration of the nation's youth from the countryside to work in the capital's construction

sites, and *Last Night I Saw You Smiling* (2019), a documentary which follows three families during their last days in their beloved, but dilapidated, apartment complex before it is torn down.

The three Israeli films are all works of director, producer, and cinematographer Avigail Sperber: *The Three of Us* is a documentary feature about a young couple's attempts to integrate their autistic son into a society that does not readily accept the neurodivergent; *If You Let Me Go* is a documentary about a 1990s pathbreaking, female, punk rocker who died young; and "Gevald," a narrative short to be shown with *If You Let Me Go*, follows an LGBTQ+ activist who challenges Jerusalem's ultra-Orthodox establishment.

All of the screenings described in the previous two paragraphs take place in the three cinemas in the Schupf Center. Check the MIFF program book or website for times and locations.

On Wednesday evening, MIFF will present its Centerpiece Film. *The Negotiator* is a new documen-

tary from the United Kingdom about Waterville native and former U.S. Senator and Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, who, among his many other accomplishments, negotiated an end to the "Troubles" in Northern Ireland in 1998. Directed by Trevor Birney, who produced last year's Closing Night Film Кпеесар, Negotiator is a "timely, contemporary, and deeply personal film [that] poses provocative ques-

tions about positive United States engagement with the wider world, and how Senator Mitchell — with his inexhaustible patience — turned the apparently impossible into the possible."

On Thursday, you can attend the world premiere of the documentary 76 Days Adrift, the first of the four, new, made-in-Maine feature films to screen during MIFF. (The other three, documentaries InhuMaine and A Moment in the Sun and thriller Sight Unseen, will not debut until the festival's closing weekend, so we'll save them for next week.)

In 76 Days, we hear the harrowing tale of Steven Callahan, a solo sailor who, after losing his boat six days into a trans-Atlantic crossing, survived for a month and a half aboard an inflatable life raft before being rescued. The film "explores not just physical endurance, but the transformative power of isolation and the profound bond between human and nature. It's more than a tale of survival — it's a meditation



Messalonskee Steps up its Milfoil Remediation Efforts



For the past 20 years, Friends of Messalonskee (FOM) has worked tirelessly to preserve the health and beauty of Messalonskee Lake. As a grassroots, volunteer organization, FOM has worked to reduce harmful runo_ into the lake, to control milfoil growth and ensure that our lake remains clear. With the assistance of State and local funding, grants, and generous donations from its members, FOM has funded milfoil removal using diver assisted suction harvesting (DASH), hand pulling, and laying barriers to growth. Without these efforts, milfoil would have taken over the shores of the lake by now, reducing property values and recreational activities.

Although FOM's efforts have made a big difference, milfoil growth has been increasing to the point that Messalonskee is now the second most infested lake in Maine. Milfoil enters the lake through the Belgrade Stream, which is heavily infested. As a result, the southern end of the lake has developed thick areas of milfoil infestation, and there are several other shoreline areas with significant growth.

FOM has now partnered with 7 Lakes Alliance and the Maine DEP to more aggressively combat milfoil. The DEP has awarded 7 Lakes a significant 2 year grant that includes funds for milfoil remediation on Messalonskee lake. There will be increased DASH, hand-pulling and laying of barriers. FOM is contributing financially to this effort, and has a team of volunteers that continually survey the lake shores to record and track milfoil growth.

FOM also partners with 7 Lakes Alliance in its Courtesy Boat Inspections (CBIs) at the lakes 2 boat launches. This year, FOM volunteers are assisting with CBIs at the Oakland boat launch one day a week for much of the summer.

With the more aggressive approach to combatting milfoil and continuing its other watershed programs, FOM has experienced increased costs. Consequently, FOM has embarked on a fundraising campaign to raise at least \$20,000 to meet these costs. A raffle is being conducted with a prize of \$5,000 to be awarded at a drawing on August 30. Raffle tickets can be purchased online with a debit card on the FOM website, friendsofmessalonskee.com, or at various public events including the Belgrade Farmers Market, Belgrade Village Green Artisan Fair, and Oakfest. You must be in Maine when you make a purchase, but you do not to be in Maine to win.

FOM is grateful to its members, donors and volunteers, and always welcomes more participation in its efforts to preserve and protect the lake.

Explore Messalonskee Lake and its Ecology by Kayak - July & August

Messalonskee Lake and Steam are wonderful natural resources of the mid-Maine region and offer numerous recreational and conservation activities. If you have always wanted to learn to kayak and explore the lake's ecology, this class will offer a free kayak lesson and will provide all equipment needed. You will also learn about the flora and fauna of the lake and stream followed by a kayak paddle near shore to find various specimens. Prerequisite: know the basics of how to swim, but we will be staying close to shore. Please wear water shoes; a bathing suit or shorts, sunglasses or polarized glasses, sunscreen, and hat are also helpful and appropriate. Do be prepared with extra clothes just in case you get wet. Belgrade History Beyond Belgrade Canning Sweet Corn

Then I was doing research on the Ice Harvesting Industry, I came across another industry that once flourished in Maine, that of the canning of sweet corn. Canned sweet corn from Maine was exported across the globe and was highly sought after. This industry lasted from the 1860s to the 1960s and brought prosperity to rural communities across Maine.

While in France in the late 1830s, sea captain, Isaac Winslow of Portland became interested in canning. He acquired the appropriate French canning



patents and during his voyage home, he developed a plan for canning Maine sweet corn. By 1844, together with his brother, Nathan, Winslow had perfected the process. First the kernels are stripped from the cob with a curved knife, then placed in a tin can. The can is heated to

kill bacteria and then hermetically sealed.

Maine's weather and its favorable growing season produced the perfect sweet corn, picked in the milk stage rather than in the ripe stage (like grain corn). Using Winslow's process, the crop quickly became a success. In 1861, 12,000,000 cans of corn were packed in Maine. With only a short time span for the harvest of sweet corn, the canning factories or "Corn Shops" needed to be located near the farms ensuring freshly picked corn. By the end of the 19th century, 75 Corn Shops could be found in rural Maine including one in Belgrade.

John Crowell Taylor, a Belgrade native of Westport, Massachusetts returned to the family farm following his 2nd marriage in 1882. In April of 1885, he and his son, Edwin opened a corn shop, J.C. Taylor & Son in Belgrade. The cannery was located near the stream bridge in Belgrade Depot. With the railroad nearby for shipping and a contract for 30 acres of sweet corn, Taylor produced a superior product. Most of his inventory was shipped to Massachusetts. Later he would expand his business to include canned apples. Belgrade's corn shop closed around 1900.

With increased competition from other parts of the country and the economic conditions of the Great Depression, Maine's corn canning industry began a steady decline. Maine's last remaining corn shop located in Farmington (site of MacDonald's and Irving station) closed in 1968.



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Take It Outside -

Grandkids Can Catch Them But Shouldn't Eat Them

ard to believe this is already the 5th column of the summer! The hot weather last week, combined with the 4th of July holiday, resulted in a lot of grandkids in Ltown for the fireworks and getting out on the lake. There was a lot of swimming, tubing, and general cooling off in and near the water. My friend Dick Greenan had his son, Jason, and grandkids Sean (9) and Ben (19) visiting for some fishing and wakeboarding. I was encouraged to see a lot of youngsters out fishing with their families. Many of the families were catching sunfish and smallmouth bass and keeping some for a 4th of July fish fry. I warned some of them that the youngsters shouldn't be eating fish from the lake. It's pretty depressing warning grandkids they shouldn't eat the fish they are catching!

I still remember the pride I felt when I first brought home fish the family would eat for dinner. I looked forward to sharing the bounty and learned to clean, cook, and eat fish. My Scandinavian family ate fish at least three or four times a week, especially during the summer. Fresh fish is still one of my favorite meals. Unfortunately, our grandchildren won't have that option, at least not until they are over the age of 8. Maine Inland Fish and Wildlife (IFW) and Maine Center for Disease Control (CDC) have issued safe consumption guidelines (https://www.maine.gov/ifw/fishing-boating/fishing/laws-rules/consumptionadvisory.html) for Maine's freshwater fish, which are contaminated with mercury. Pregnant and nursing women, women who may get pregnant, and children under age 8 are advised to eat NO freshwater fish from Maine's inland waters, except that they may safely consume one meal per month of brook trout or landlocked salmon. All others are advised to eat no more than two freshwater fish meals per month, except for brook trout and landlocked salmon, which can be safely consumed once a week. The

primary source of the mercury in Maine's lakes and rivers is air pollution from coal-fired power plants in the Midwest. These plants are being phased out but WAY too slowly. Maine is particularly susceptible to mercury pollution because of our acidic precipitation and thin soils with little or no carbonates that can provide buffering. There are other site-specific restrictions for other contaminants, such as PFAS, PCBs, DIOXINS, and DDT. Recently, Maine CDC issued a consumption advisory for PFAS/PFOS for fish caught in Salmon Lake and McGrath Pond. The general population should consume no more than one fish meal a month from these waters (children under 8 and pregnant females should consume no fish). In the Messalonskee Stream between Rice Rips and the Kennebec, adults should consume no more than three fish meals a YEAR. Please check the IFW website above before consuming your fish. And please contact your federal legislators and ask them to support stricter air pollution standards so we can eat the fish we catch!

On a brighter note, I did get out hiking a bit and the trails are in good shape thanks to the hard work of the 7-Lakes Stewardship Committee. Each trail has a volunteer "Trail Steward" who hikes the trails regularly, does routine maintenance and reports more difficult projects to Dan Woughter. For French Mountain, Chris and Andy Cook are the Trail Stewards and they regularly get their kids and grandkids outside to take care of the trails as a family project.

On July 5th, I did my annual "morning after" cleanup cruise the morning after the fireworks. Most years I get one or two bags of floating debris, fireworks remnants, dead fish, beach balls, etc. This year the lake was clean, in part because it was a smaller show, done from land, and attracted fewer boaters. Fireworks are loud and exciting but are not great for our water quality or the nesting loons raising their chicks. Every different color is from a different heavy metal. The propellant contains a lot of perchlorate and phosphorus. The most dangerous are the so-called "water kegs," which are fired into the water and explode underwater while firing more fireworks up into the air. Many large venues like Sea World, Disney, and others are switching over to laser light shows and Continued on page 10 ...

Tpon first setting my sights on the white-dappled and red-eyed Common Loons of our very own Great Pond, I instantly fell in love.

During my training with Lee Attix and Dick Greenan on both Great and Long Pond, I learned about a hundred different little things a day. I observed loon behavior from aggression to courtship, their feeding habits, and even the way these heavy-bodied birds take flight. No sight is quite as fascinating as a loon flapping its wings while using its big-strong legs and feet to schlip-schlap across the water's surface as it builds up enough momentum for takeoff!

As a long-time duck enthusiast, I was surprised to learn that loons are genetically more closely related to penguins than other waterfowl! This makes sense if you have ever seen these birds underwater. move speed and precision, they dive and quickly catch their aquatic prey. No wonder these birds are the apex predators of the lakes!

Coming from a warmer climate in Georgia, I had not

encountered loons until I came to Maine to study at Colby College. But my love for working with birds did not start with loons. Last summer, I worked and lived as a field intern on Outer Green Island off the coast of Portland and spent my days monitoring a breeding colony of Common Terns. These quirky and loveable seabirds of the family Laridae, which includes gulls, are noisy little fellows. Terns enjoy dive-bombing interns such as myself during chick check-ins. My first summer of

> fieldwork in Maine made me fall in love with the state's wildlife. Compelled to continue working in conservation, I applied to the Loon Project.

Working with the BLA, my summer has been ever more exciting with the elusive Common Loon. While they

can be just as, if not more, intense than the terns, puttering around on the skiff and observing the loons has been a pleasantly quiet respite. On a clear and windless day, you can see loons as they mesmerizingly swim by the boat just under the surface of the water. Watching the chicks emerge and be fed minnows by their parents has been enchanting.

Monitoring the loons is always an adventure. It requires attention to detail and the ability to sustain long hours in the baking sun. With my co-intern and friend Makena Logan at my side, we get the job done. I am grateful for all the support I receive not only from Dick of the Belgrade Lakes Association, Lee of the Loon Conservation Associates, and Cathy Bevier of Colby College, but also from the community on both lakes. The help of volunteers in updating us and loaning us their kayaks makes this project possible. Loons are a valuable indicator of water quality and bring joy to those lucky enough to cross paths with one. As I continue my work on the lakes, I hope to gather valuable information on our loon populations to help us keep them around for decades to come!

Call Me American

This memoir by Somali Abdi Nor Iftin is not what I expected. Having already enjoyed Somali immigrant books about soccer in Lewiston, I was expecting the American "victory lap." Not so with this young man who finally arrived at Logan Airport on page 258 when he was in his late twenties.

Most of his memoir tells the story of his more than twenty years in Civil War Somalia. Yes, there are a few happy years with his family before war, living a dreamlike nomad life. His dad was a basketball star of renown and the happy memories are short and brief. Trekking to the city and the following years and years of war are beyond my comprehension.

Abdi and his brother choose different paths. Memorizing the entire Koran under such terror teacher techniques makes me sympathize with Abdi's rebellious brother who refuses the daily discipline.


Losing contact for three years with his father is another loss and brings Abdi's obligation to his mother's survival. Frequenting American movies was Abdi's big transgression to Muslim life, but soon his American speech and translating ability gained him fame like his dad's basketball stardom years before.

Somehow good luck follows his ever so long war torn trek through his hometown of Mogadishu, Somalia and environs: nothing but civil war everywhere. Even meeting a girlfriend at the beach and swimming in the salty sea, breaking another Muslim rule.

Abdi's American speech reaches NPR here and BBC in London. He carries on weekly radio interviews in his deep underground hidey-hole in his war torn Mogadishu home.

Luck strikes Abdi, but to me, the reader, it is all so very dreary from day to day with challenges for finding food for his mom and quiet sleep from noisy war.

"This was the beginning of my new life...practicing how to dance with the



crowd on the sidewalk...I decided if I was going to talk like an American, I should dance like one."

However accomplished Abdi became with his daily Koran memorizing and discipline it required, friends would knock on the door and ask his mom, "Is Abdi American here?" At age fourteen, he was kicked out of his home and he went to find his rebellious brother who had not memorized the Koran like he had...very discouraging to read this story of his constant struggles in spite of successes. Living on the edge with warlords all around ready to chop a hand or leg off is way beyond my comprehension.

Abdi survived and so did his brother.

Abdi's work experience in Yarmouth was not an American dream fulfilled, yet he had a kind American family providing a safe home and abundant food. He finally found Somali friends in Portland where he moved and worked as an English translator. The weekend soccer games were a relaxing release with Somalis who had lived here ten years.

Meeting a new girlfriend and her family were also trying in his life due to Muslim demands by the parents. Did he marry her, I wonder?

Finding so many resolutions at once at the end of this memoir makes me wonder about his brother still in Kenya with a wife and children by now. His mom and other relatives receive money regularly from Abdi, making life so much more bearable back in Somalia. But, how does he keep a'going I keep asking myself. Speaking American actually got him here after too many hoops and years in Kenya camps waiting.

I am hoping to meet this good luck guy in August who has faced far more than I can totally take in.

What does he make of Maine lingo? Maybe he saw a movie or two in Mogadishu with Maine American actors spoken like us? Ah, yuh, hope so.


on what keeps us going when all hope seems lost."

Real Estate Update

Seasonal Shift: Summer Cooling Is the Norm in Maine Real Estate


Summer is traditionally the peak season for real estate activity— Characterized by strong demand, high inventory, and frequent bidding wars. But seasoned agents know that summer also marks a turning point. After the spring rush, momentum typically slows by mid to late summer as buyer urgency fades, pickiness rises, and mortgage rates often inch upward.

This year is no exception—though it comes with some telling shifts. Inventory across Maine is up significantly—61% higher than this time last year—giving buyers more choice. But with affordability stretched by elevated interest rates and still-high home prices, many are sitting on the sidelines or taking longer to make decisions. As a result, the average days on market has extended by about 10 days statewide compared to 2024. In the Belgrade Lakes Region, some higher end properties are now sitting over 100 days before going under contract.

While sales volume has flattened and price growth has moderated, this is a cooling, not a crash. Maine's real estate market is shifting toward balance, not tipping into a full buyer's market. Coastal and urban areas—like Portland, Camden, and parts of the Midcoast—are still seeing faster movement. But the statewide trend is clear: the post-pandemic surge has softened, and buyers and sellers are recalibrating.

Whether you're a buyer looking for options or a seller adjusting expectations, understanding this seasonal rhythm is key to making informed decisions in Maine's evolving market.

The Dams Keeper Report

Well, the water temperature is finally warming up a bit more to my liking – BUT is still not quite THERE!! Upper Long Pond (at least the top 12") is a refreshing 78.7 F today (7/2/25) and in my humble opinion, obviously refreshing but not perfect! My toes will tell you that it is nowhere near 78.7F down there and still takes some getting used too! Oh, to be ten years old again!

The weather for our July 3rd Fireworks is looking better (at least as I pen this issue!) and the 4th Festivities looks perfect for our Boat and Street Parades. Boy, did we luck out and we deserve it especially considering the rain that we've had to endure earlier this season. We've had 2.23" of precipitation for the past ten days and they are forecasting 1.69" for the next 10 suggesting that our precipitation levels are actually pretty normal. Great weather overall. Summer in Maine – you've got to love it!!

The Village spillway dam is presently at 1.56" above full pond with both gates closed. Long Pond, at the Wings Mill Dam, is 2.4" also above full pond with both gates still closed. Snow Pond is holding at 2.28" below their spillway which is still good considering their electricity generation needs. Salmon and McGrath are in great shape and exactly at full pond with the 1 cfs. calibrated valve opened 15 turns. Great job Cam!
