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50th Annual Blueberry Festival Coming to Winslow Saturday, August 14!



ne of Maine's all-time most popular, beloved, and downright yummy summer events—Winslow's annual Blueberry Festival—is coming this year on Saturday, August 14, from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m., to Winslow Congregational Church, 12 Lithgow Street, Winslow. Admission to the festival grounds is FREE.

Nearly 700 mouth-watering blueberry pies and "all things blueberry" baked goods will be available for sale. Blueberry pies (\$12 each; \$20 for 2; \$10 each for additional pies) may be picked up at the church anytime from 3 to 6 p.m. the previous evening (Friday, August 13) or the day of the festival (Saturday the 14th) from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Kicking off the 50th Annual Blueberry Festival on Saturday will be a delicious Blueberry Pancake Breakfast, from 7 to 10 a.m. Cost of the breakfast will be \$7 per person and \$5 for children ages 12 and under. Tickets for the pancake breakfast will be available in advance at Winslow Congregational Church on the Saturday prior to the festival (August 7) from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. In addition to the "all things blueberry" pies and other culinary delights, festival patrons will enjoy a Lobster Shore-Dinner Raffle; live classical, pop, folk, and blues music; local crafts vendors; a yard sale; a popcorn vendor; an agricultural exhibit featuring goats; a dunk tank sponsored by Winslow Community Cupboard food pantry; and a firetruck and police car.

Night-Before (Friday Evening) Chicken Bar-B-Q Supper

The night before the Blueberry Festival, there will be a Friday-evening (August 13) Chicken Bar-B-Q Supper (with "all the fixin's") at Winslow Congregational Church, which will be served by first-responders from the Clinton Fire Department. The Chicken Bar-B-Q Supper will run from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. Blueberry pies, blueberry baked goods, and a yard sale also will be available during the Friday-evening supper. Cost of the Chicken Bar-B-Q supper is \$12 per person, with advance tickets strongly encouraged, but dayof tickets also available. Advance tickets will be available at Winslow Congregational Church on the Saturdays prior to the festival (August 7) from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m., and also at Rita's House of Pizza (51 Bay Street) and Pool Tech (28 Charland St.) during regular business hours through Thursday, August 12.





– Take It Outside –

The summer is flying by. Hard to believe this is the penultimate edition of "Summertime!" The weather has continued to be variable- some rainy days with cool nights interspersed with a few hot and humid days, but occasionally really nice for hiking in the shady woods. With more of our population vaccinated against COVID, many of last year's restrictions have been relaxed and we are seeing more of our traditional summer visitors. At the same time, we seem to have more visitors from throughout the State of Maine; many exploring our area instead of traveling out of state as they may have in the past. There continues to be an increase in family gatherings with an emphasis on outdoor activities. It is heartening to run into so many families out enjoying the local trails. While people have changed their schedules, Mother Nature continues to move forward with hers and this summer is moving forward just as rapidly as it always does.

Recently, my neighbors, Joel and Kathi King, returned from North Carolina with their 8-year-old grandson, Miles, for a week-long visit. Miles is an avid fisherman and Grandma Kathi asked me if I could take him out on Long Pond for a bit. The next morning, Kathi and Miles met me at the dock a bit before 7 AM and we headed down the lake toward a spot where the bass had been pretty actively feeding all week. The first thing I noticed was that the cool night (mid 50s F) had cooled the surface water from about 75F down to 70F overnight. I spotted loons feeding in an area and we slowed to trolling speed. 

Relaxing times, particularly during this breeding period, can be short lived as they all are constantly being challenged by their own kind, mostly territorial disputes.






The Issue of Forest Pests i.e. "Forest Bugs"

Previously I had an article about invasive plants and the ways to monitor your property and manage for their spread. This week I will focus on invasive forest pests or "bugs". Maine's Soil & Water Conservation Districts have been working with the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry, Division of Animal and Plant Health to help people identify invasive forest pests i.e. bugs that could do serious damage to our woodlands or in some cases cause you illness. While some of them have not yet appeared in Maine, many have. We need to be vigilant and identify them should they appear.

The browntail moth is already here and got the most press coverage this spring. Some areas of the State are affected more than others. Many people are experiencing the rash on their skin and other

problems. Kennebec County and the midcoast were more heavily infested.





suffered serious damage. As I write this the BTMoths are at the stage of laying their eggs in small webs in the leaves of trees. We expect those to hatch and become the caterpillars again in August. This moths' caterpillar has two distinct red/orange dots on its back. These caterpillars will then create distinctive tents later in the summer and early fall. Those winter webs appear at the end of branches rather than closer to the trunk in crotches of the branches. Oak trees and fruit trees seem the more likely targets.

The browntail moth caterpillar has tiny (0.15 mm) poisonous hairs (setae) that cause dermatitis (skin rash) similar to poison ivy on sensitive individuals. Direct contact with the caterpillar or indirect contact with airborne hairs may cause the reaction. Most people affected by the hairs develop a localized rash lasting a few hours or several days but on some individuals the rash can be severe and last for weeks. It is also possible for respiratory problems to develop which require a physician visit and possible treatment. We have yet to see how bad the caterpillar infestation will be this fall. This seems to have been the season of invasives. how bad this spring's infestation was, it could be heavy. If you have questions about what to do about browntail moth - rashes, trees, or otherwise call 211.

> Another forest pest already here is Hemlock Woolly Adelgid. It is not that uncommon. We have been working to identify its location, possible spread and efforts to control damage. Evidence of its existence are "woolly' collections on the underside of hemlock branches along the stems where the needles occur. It only occurs on hemlock trees.

> Up until two years ago we had not officially seen the Emerald Ash Borer. It is now officially identified in Maine, particularly at our SW border with New Hampshire and also in Northern Maine. Identify it early and try and limit its spread. The Emerald Ash Borer can devastate woodlots of Ash trees. Once fully established, destroying the wood is often the best option. The small shiny green insects bore into the Ash trees and destroy the tree from the inside. Sick Ash trees are suspect. The insects are tiny [see photo of examples placed on a penny] and the actual holes in the tree's bark are also very small. The damage to the Ash tree is the best way to begin identification.

What can a person do? Try and learn how to identify some of these nasty Forest Pests. The

Maine Dept. of Agriculture, Conservation Forestry and has an excellent website for all invasives including these Forest Pests.

Or contact them through Maine Bug Watch at bugwathcme.agr@maine.gov. would rather help you learn it is NOT an invasive than have you fail to report the real deal. Take a picture or collect the bug in a bag or bottle and keep it in the freezer. Help out in this effort to protect Maine from these invasives.

Remember, protecting the woods is one way to protect water quality. Do your part!

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
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


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
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
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Kennebec on Fire Festival at Coburn Park, Skowhegan, a Fundraiser for the Wesserunsett Arts Council

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

The Dams Keeper Report

We were so spoiled by the drought inspired past five years of beautiful weather that it was so easy to take it for granted, although to the demise of our farmers and gardeners! This has been such an unusually cold and wet summer so far. Don't you think that we deserve a little bit better after putting up with the winters that we do? I do!

We just finished releasing some of the water both at the Village and at Long Pond's Wings Mill dam in order to get the levels back down to something reasonable, about three inches above full pond.

Long Pond is presently 2.5" above full pond with Great Pond at 2.64", also above full, with all of the gates completely shut back down. Snow Pond is today right at 3.84"" below full pond with their electricity generation and Salmon/McGrath is now 2" above full pond with their single gate still opened the mandatory 1 cfs. We received 1.76" of rain in just the past ten days, which honestly felt like so much more. We're still having showers practically every day and they are forecasting just .45" of precipitation




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

The special feature in this particular compilation that impresses me is that each author wrote so many other great stories for your children's enjoyment.

favorite mushrooms and are extremely tasty with scrambled eggs. They are also outstanding sauteed lightly with butter and a bit of onions and then broiled on top of fresh-caught Rainbow trout fillets.

As I mentioned, Mother Nature is sticking to her schedule, pandemic or no pandemic. As the water warms, the coldwater fish are moving deeper. The larger pike and bass continue to forage on alewives approximately 25-ft down while the smaller fish remain in the shallows feeding on crayfish and insects while trying to avoid becoming pike or loon food. Hopefully there will be enough time before ice-in for the new loon chick(s) to learn to fly before they get iced in. Mother Nature doesn't change her schedule. Some of the swamp red maples along the shore are already beginning to turn red.

Take advantage of the rest of the summer and get out on the lakes or hike or bike in the hills. And take a kid along. You will be creating memories that will last.
