Maine's legendary moniker "vacationland," recreation suits the schedule.

As limiting as tending a potted plant on a balcony or porch or as limitless as the sky itself (skydiving anyone?) recreation, especially in the summer, presents boundless and endless opportunities.

Formally, recreation means activity done for enjoyment when one is not working; it's origins lie in late Middle English in the sense of mental or spiritual consolation. Informally in this beautiful, bountiful part of the world it means whatever's waiting on the other side of the door. Open it and there are lakes and ponds and streams and rivers that belong to everyone; trails and tracks and paths and sidewalks that beckon to everyone; ballfields and playgrounds and sports facilities and community parks that embrace everyone.

It would be impossible and perhaps foolish to list every form and facet of outdoor outlet, activity, sport, event, presentation, celebration and relaxation, not to mention the indoor options, that await under the umbrella of recreation in Maine because it appears to be just about everything.

In Maine recreation is big business. Industry sources indicate that Maine is 5th in the nation for the value outdoor recreation adds to the State's economy while guestimates are that outdoor recreation contributes over \$3 billion to Maine's economy and accounts for close to 5% of all jobs in the State. Boating and fishing alone

contribute over \$400,000.

But recreation is also - in Maine talk - small potatoes, as small as the pauses that people take in pursuit of an interest or a passion or distraction...or "just looking."

Where there is recreation there will be that other great summer pastime - spectating or watching. From loud crowds filling bleachers at arenas and stadiums cheering on horse or tractor or music competitions to elbow-bumping family groups attending fairs and festivals to the small town Americana of parents pulling carts or coolers loaded with snacks, extra clothing, deck chairs and umbrellas for an afternoon at a ball park or sports court there's a lot of watching going on.

Recreation, thankfully, is testimony to nobody left behind. Too old, too young, too timid, too tired?...forget all that. There is a lesson to be learned from the Travis Mills Foundation program of "Rest and Relaxation for Recalibrated Veterans" on Long Pond where recreation is the antidote to whatever has damaged or could be dragging a military hero's life downward. Or, consider Pine Tree Camp for children and adults with developmental and physical disabilities on North Pond where the best days in a camper's year and even forever belong to the week when accessible recreation opens up trails and treehouses, waterfront activities, archery, arts and crafts and friendships.

No gear? No problem. From state gear-share companies to the "too good to throw out" shed at

a local dump, gear can be had, and day camps, coaches' private collections and rec centers often have available a shareable stash as well. Skowhegan Rec, for example, has a basecamp that loans out all season camping gear, trail maps, field guides and an array of summer sports gear that ranges from canoes to bike helmets, paddles, paddle boards, life jackets, day bags and more.

Except for a few guarded secrets about where the biggest fish or the best blueberries are, there is no lack of willingness to share recreation enjoyment and expertise in the region. Opportunities for children to be introduced to sports through schools, clubs, camps and recreation programs are plentiful. Although the many rec programs in the area are usually reasonably priced, interest in outdoor recreation also starts with family outings.

For individuals a great source to find things recreational and sociable is to study local posters and bulletin boards (which in itself is a form of recreation) and voila: here's one, an invitation from the Cumston Cruisers in Monmouth - a merry band of Saturday morning runners of all varieties who try to stick together but it's ok to break off because often "we land at the bakery afterwards!"

Finally, don't forget that canine pet. Just say "walk," "ride in the boat," or "let's go out" and enjoy being in Maine, in the Belgrades, in the right place at the right time.

Enjoy recreationland.

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Summertime in the Belgrades

A Hike Up "The Mountain"


In 1998, the Belgrade Regional Conservation Alliance, which is now part of the 7 Lakes Alliance, and the Belgrade Lakes Association, bought 207 acres on The Mountain, which rises along the western shore of Great Pond in Rome and is 665 feet at its highest point. (Yes, it is simply called "The Mountain," with a capital T. It does not have any other name.)

The Mountain has a network of mostly easy hiking trails. The trail head is on Mountain Drive, a well maintained camp road 8/10 of mile north of the Rome town line on the Great Pond side of Route 27. Look sharp, or you'll miss the turn! (If you're coming from the other direction, it's 2.1 miles south of the Route 225 junction.) The trail head is 3/10 of mile down Mountain Road on the left.

An old logging road, the main trail gradually ascends from the six-car parking lot. It is wide and relatively smooth. In winter, it is used by snow-mobilers.


After 4/10 of a mile, the Great Pond Loop branches out to the east, on the right as you ascend. A tenth of a mile later, the Long Pond Loop splits off to the west. Both loops offer views of their eponymous ponds, but those views are obscured by leaves at this time of year. Both loops subsequently rejoin the main trail.

An able-bodied adult or an ambitious child can easily complete both loops and return to the parking area within two hours. Dogs are welcome, as long as they are leashed, and their owners clean up after them. For more information, go to *https://www.7lakesalliance.org/trails-mttrail. Continued on page 14...*

New Book of Old Images Celebrates the Historic Belgrades



including tourism, camps, industry and change, the book invites both page-by-page reading and random thumbing through in search of a personal connection or the answer to a long-held question about times of yore.

Gone into the archives of memories and pictures are the many farms that once dominated the local economy. Also gone is the era of fishing guides and the distinctive double-ended Belgrade guide boat, the grand hotels, the train stations, the buckboard wagons that transported summer folks to their camps and the fashions and hair styles of the day. But many buildings and street scenes remain and are chronicled in the book.

The granite house in Belgrade Lakes Village, for example, has changed very little except for windows added when the building was converted from a store to a house. We learn from the photo that the granite for this 1838 structure was quarried from Vienna Mountain across the lake and that two stone masons were paid \$.50 a day and all the rum they could drink to haul the slabs across frozen Long Pond in the winter.

Another familiar building is the unaltered barn at Winterberry Farm where vegetables and flowers are popular at the farmstand today. Completed in 1888-1889, the barn's unique design provides natural cooling to keep stored hay from catching fire.

The book is fun and informative to read and a great gift for the many visitors and vacationers who have connections to youth camps and scenes around the lakes. It can be purchased through the Belgrade Historical Society or at Oliver & Friends Bookshop on Main Street in Belgrade Lakes

Dozens of outstanding historic photos fill the pages of the Images of America book "The Belgrades Lakes Region" by Eric Hooglund, but it is the captions that bring history to life. Buildings identified, dates clarified, interesting anecdotes and names attached to people previously unnamed fill the pages and provide a chronicle of the Belgrade Lakes area. Divided into 7 chapters outlining specific categories of the region,


Welcome Back

reetings to the greater Belgrade Lakes Community and Jwelcome back summer residents and visitors. We are finally approaching what infectious disease experts call, "herd immunity" and appear to be finally approaching a bit of normalcy. The pandemic has changed many things about how we interact with other people, do shopping, and the types of activities that we are comfortable carrying out. It has also clearly shown the great value we place on having clean, healthy lakes and forests where we can safely spend time with family and friends and at least temporarily find refuge from external stresses. Every study continues to show outside activities are far safer than those conducted inside.

When I was growing up and there was any kind of ruckus in the house, which was pretty common with six kids, my mother would tell us to, "Take it outside!" We would then head out to the woods behind the house to find something to do. My mother was a wise woman. Fifty years before Richard Louv wrote Last Child in the Woods in 2008, she had an innate understanding of "Nature Deficit Disorder" and knew that direct exposure to nature is essential for a child's healthy

physical and emotional development. Louv and others later proved that kids who spend a lot of time outside are healthier, have longer attention spans, and are less likely to suffer from depression or childhood obesity. If you haven't read Louv's book, you should. I hope this column will inspire you to take advantage of all the outdoor recreation opportunities in our area and especially about the importance of getting youngsters outside and interacting with Mother Nature. Mother Nature is an amazing teacher and we can all learn from her, especially in these stressful times.

During the recent pandemic, public health officials were consistent in telling us to "Take it outside." Staying physically active is one of the best ways to keep your mind and body healthy, and carefully planned and executed outdoor activities are inherently safer than indoor activities. As I write this, all the local 7 Lakes Alliance and State of Maine (Kennebec Highlands) hiking trails and preserves are open for use by the public. I encourage people to get out and use the trails, especially with your families. But follow all guidelines and be safe. Visit the 7-Lakes Alliance website (https://www.7lakesalliance.org/) for the latest guidance and updates and to download maps of the trails. There some new trails this year as 7 Lakes has added over 1000 acres since last year, including the top of Vienna Mountain.

Like last year, this winter seemed to come and go, with snow followed by melting, rain, and then more snow and cold. The ice went out in the second

week of April, followed by a cool, windy spring. At the end of April, we had 5-inches of rain, which caused a lot of flooding and damaged a lot of docks. The fishing has been good, especially for bass, pike, and trout. In the nearby Kennebec River, the alewives and shad have returned earlier than usual. Normally, these fish are still in the river in early June, and I highly recommend trying your hand with a flyrod or light spinning tackle, especially if you have never caught a shad before. The fish are big, strong, and will hit Continued on page 11...


erful voice is always wonderfully expressed on-screen."

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
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

Loon Project Welcomes 2 Colby Interns

TATelcome back to another Summertime in the Belgrades and the third year of our "Call of the Loon"! Like last year, we will be interspersing this column with weekly photo galleries of our iconic bird in action which we hope you will enjoy as much as we have bringing them to you.

As you may or not know, our local Belgrade Lakes Association is into their fifth year of their Loon Preservation Project to develop a responsible comprehensive plan in order to support our loon population in the very best sustainable manner.

Our surveys began in earnest this past Monday on Great Pond and Long Pond on Tuesday. Although it appeared to be too early to observe nesting loons on Great Pond, we did witness 3 nesting pairs and caught one of the nests temporarily unoccupied with 2 eggs on Long Pond. A very lucky observation and just being at the right place at the right time!

Our loons typically nest around Memorial Day and, with an average 27-28 day gestation period, we expect to see our first chicks as early as Father's Day on June 18th this year, up until around the 4th of July. But, with any luck, we'll have four to six chicks on lower Long Pond the week before! Break out the cigars!

Now for some really Great News!! Thanks to our loon consultant and mentor, Lee Attix, and Colby College's Professor of Biology and Program leader, Catherine Bevier, BLA's Loon Project will have assistance from two outstanding Colby College interns this summer. Kate Jaffee and Brynne Robbins, will provide some young eyes along with their tremendous accumulative experience! Our valued loon volunteers' will continue with their eyes on the lakes but will now be assisted by two very capable and dedicated students to assist all of us with the daily observations. Equally important will be their expertise in record keeping those statistics to better assess our efforts and future activities.

Kate is a current sophomore majoring in environmental science with a focus in biodiversity and conservation. Brynne is currently a freshman with a major in environmental policy and has most recently provided testimony in support of DEP's Lake Restoration and Protection Fund. Both of our new interns come with a great deal of experience; including experience as a courtesy boat inspector, invasive plant patroller, junior environmental and floating educator, etc. Please join us in welcoming Kate and Brynne! We are very fortunate to have these two individuals on the Team!

small, weighted flies and jigs bounced along the bottom. They are a lot of fun to catch. By the time this article is published, the water temperature will be in the mid to high 60's in most of our lakes

and the bass will be in the shallows, either on their own beds or chasing sunfish on theirs. Fast action can be had with streamer flies, surface poppers, jerk baits, or Senko type jigs. On Memorial Day Weekend, my youngest grandson, "Bub," visited and we went fishing. He caught a smallmouth bass and I showed him how to hold the fish so I could take a picture. He had a very serious look so I told him to "smile" and show me his fish. At that instant, the fish "flopped" and ended up back in the lake. We'll get a big smile on the next one.


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
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

The Dams Keeper Report

Welcome back to another Summertime in the Belgrades and the eighth year of the Dams Keeper Report. Although we are still recovering from our May 1st five and a half inches of rain in less than 24 hrs. storm, our ponds are still reeling from its effects. Long Pond came up 18" over a three day period!! As of this writing, we are slowly getting back to summer levels. Great Pond's Village dam is still a whopping 5.40" above full pond with gate 1 now opened just 18". Long Pond and its Wings Mill dam is 3.84", also above full pond with Gate 1 now opened just one foot. Salmon/McGrath is right at 1" above full pond with its calibrated valve opened just the mandated 1 cfs. flow. Our neighbors on Messalonskee are presently down 5.52" below full which is commendable considering the amount of water the aforementioned ponds are sending their way!

With another drought forecasted, we are trying to begin our summer with all of the ponds at 3" above full pond. If you recall, at 3" above full, the water level shouldn't float off any one's dock (Of course, that is assuming that one has found all of their washed out dock sections!) and more importantly, not flood out any of our native hummock style loon nests.

Just like last year, this year's long-term forecast is only for 77% of normal rain for May through July, with a slight increase 87% of the normal rainfall for August through November. This slight increase in rain, if we do get it, will be great news for our farmers, those with shallow wells and of course, our ponds.

Your Dams Committee will begin the extensive concrete remediation on the Village Dam most likely late August or early September. Although this is estimated to be a two-week project, we will have a temporary coffer dam in place so that we do not lose any of our precious water.


The Lake Where Loon Lives by Maine author Brenda Reeves Sturgis
