our cars, two horses, an empty guitar case (good find for a guitar that didn't have one), two unmatched nightstands, a kid's car with a broken motor - for great fun pushing, a step ladder, diverse picture frames, even more diverse mirrors, a bale of hay, seedlings, fresh-picked corn, berries, many dozens of delicious eggs and much more - just one collection of side-of-the-road discoveries or purchases.

It's shopping time and stopping time on the backroads and byways of the region and since it's also destination time, why not allow extra time and keep alert to what's for sale - or for the taking - along the route.

There are no guidelines to shopping the back roads other than maybe something always looked and longed for is just waiting for a new owner or something never looked nor longed for offers an opportunity too good to pass by.

Once a common roadside commodity, cars are making a private sale comeback but the few-hundred-dollar "winterbeater" style may be gone for good. Those were the days when a car that ran and held its own on ice and snow and was not considered a bit pretty could be purchased off many

a lawn.

Also not too common any more are hand-written signs advertising puppies, kittens or other pets, but there occasionally are so remember that "just looking" rarely works. As one proud puppy-parent couple recently described they got away and down the road for maybe half a mile before turning back to pick out a puppy.

One category of today's leading side-of-theroad sale items is watercraft of all sizes and conditions, including kayaks and canoes. Firewood, including kindling, is another popular roadside sale item. And, the "open" flags are already flying

on farmstands and produce will soon be for sale as well in front of many homes.

Buying vegetables, berries, flowers and eggs from roadside coolers, display racks, tables and bins is a unique experience. If the stands are unattended - and they often are - the transaction will involve an "honor" jar or box for the purchase price to be deposited and even for change to made.

One staple of the summer season are the many lawn sales, yard sales, barn sales and garage sales inviting the backroad traveler to stop and look and often where there has been a sale there will be a "free" pile that's worth looking over, too. Maybe free and usually not in the totally good shape category are old tools, sports gear and camp items which just happen to be the decor of choice for furnishing lake area properties. Fishing gear, paddles, even worn-out life jackets, look fine hanging in rustic splendor on camp walls and are not to be overlooked in that pile of free stuff.

Not all finds at the side of the road are material. A sign for a trail, either in-town or remote, can catch the eye and the curiosity for a great hike. Signs for sites - historic, scenic, conservation demonstration areas - lead to interesting informational and educational discoveries. And signs for services may lead to getting something - finally - built or repaired.

Town of Fairfield Observed National Trails Day with Opening of Cattail Trail





His numerous publications include a history of the Lebanese immigrant community in Waterville, 1900-1940 and recently The Belgrade Lakes Region(Arcadia Publications, 2023, Images of America Series).

Take It Outside —


Crepuscular Fishing



ike last year, this has been a cool, wet, and windy transition to summer, with some occasional very hot days. The fishing has continued to be productive, Jespecially early in the morning and late in the evening. I love fishing these crepuscular periods when the lake is typically dead calm, and it is easy to spot fish feeding on or near the surface. Surface feeding fish often indicate an insect hatch taking place with some fish (often trout or small bass) sucking the bugs off the surface, creating dimples. Often larger fish will be just below the smaller fish at the surface, eating the smaller fish or the nymphs (insect larvae) just

below the surface waiting to emerge. In our lakes, we also get schools of landlocked alewives disturbing the surface while spawning in relatively shallow (less than about 25 feet) coves. Often these schools are being

chased by larger fish and you will see occasional large splashes as a bass or brown trout picks one off. For this situation I like to keep one of my flyrods rigged with a White Zonker, a streamer that nicely mimics the landlocked alewives in the lake. It's usually easy to catch several nice bass or white perch under these conditions. A spinning rod (I prefer an ultralight) rigged with almost anything silver, such as a small jerk bait (such as a Rapala), Mepps spinner, or Weeping Willow spoon








Long Pond Splake

is also quite effective. I was recently surprised to catch a nice splake in Long Pond. A splake is a hybrid between a male brook trout (often called a speckled trout, especially in Canada) and a female lake trout (typically called Togue in Maine). Fisheries biologists like them because they grow faster than either of their parent species. Splake are not stocked in Long Pond, but some are stocked in Messalonskee Lake. With the very high flows we had last month, some of

> them likely were able to swim upstream over the Wings Mill Dam into Long Pond. By the time this article is published, the water temperatures will

> be over 70°F in the lakes and the bass will be in the shallows either sitting on their own beds or chasing the sunfish on theirs. It is a fun time for fly fishermen to catch a lot of fish on streamer flies or surface poppers, especially at dawn or dusk. Spinning gear also works well with surface lures, especially at dusk. It can be a great time to teach a youngster how to fish because the action is fast. A worm-baited hook and bobber off the dock is especially effective in getting kids "hooked on fishing." My friends, Chris and Andy Cook of Rome, have grandkids near and far that have a way of showing up "Cook's Camp" throughout the year to hike, swim, fish, and otherwise enjoy the lake with their cousins. Check out some of the pictures below to see these kids "Taking it Outside." As I pointed out last week, kids who spend a lot of time outside tend to be healthier and sleep better at night!

Recently, I stopped off for a quick hike at French Mountain. As I

was headed up, I met Emily Shea, of Winthrop finishing a hike with her son, Henry, and her friend from Colorado, Ginni Bradbury, holding her dog, Oliver Clark. Emily says she loves to bring her out-of-town friends to French Mountain to get a spectacular view of Maine with a nice, short hike.


When you see two adults in profile, the larger of the two is 'generally' the male but not always and the only way to definitely determine sex is by a blood and feather analysis.



The Dams Keeper Report

s of this writing, we are happy to report that Aall of our pond water levels are in great shape if you like water! Actually, a little bit higher than we would like no thanks to these unrelenting showers! It hasn't been exactly Chamber of Commerce weather but enough is enough. I wish the showers took place at night while I was sleeping, but noooooo. Great Pond's Village dam is currently 3.24" above full pond with one gate opened just 6". Long Pond's Wings Mill dam is right at 2.88", also above full pond with one gate opened up one foot. Salmon/McGrath is now 1" above full pond with its calibrated valve set to the mandated 1 cfs. flow. Our neighbors on Messalonskee are actually down 2.52" below full which is just a fact of life with their electricity generation needs. Although NOAA and the 'experts' are still calling for a summer of 26% less precipitation, we'll remain vigilant in our "save the water" mode with all of our gates being

closed when at all possible.

Precipitation for the past 10 days was a whopping 2.48" and we are looking at still 1.49" for the next 10 days, which is still way above average. FYI, our normal weekly precipitation during the summer is supposed to be 0.875. Although the long-term forecast is calling for an average 20% less precipitation which is slightly better than what they forecasted for the past four years, all remains good news for our farmers, wells, gardens and of course, our lakes. We'll take what we can get – as if we have a choice!

7 Lakes Monitors Results of Great Meadow Stream Treatment, Remediates Remaining Infestations

No invasive milfoil was found this spring in Great Meadow Stream after last summer's herbicide treatment. 7 Lakes Alliance continues to monitor the treatment area, as regrowth has been observed in similar treatment areas, including Annabessacook Lake in nearby Cobbossee watershed.

The Surface Use Restriction prohibiting motorcraft from entering Great Meadow Stream will continue in 2023. Paddle craft are welcome (and encouraged) to experience the beauty of Great Meadow Stream, which provides habitat to a variety of waterfowl, rare plants and other wildlife.

Three small streams in the north of Great Pond – Rome Trout Brook (aka Turner's Brook), Robbins Mill Stream, and Swann's Brook – still have small infestations of invasive variable-leaf milfoil. The 7 Lakes' crew continues to manually remove and cover invasive plants in these areas.

No herbicide treatments are planned for 2023 at this time.

Real Estate Update —

How Selling is Trending

Te are early in the year as far as real estate. The median sales price in the region so far in 2023 is homes for the past 3 years and there are not enough sales are concerned, but we can start to see how things are trending. Understanding what the current market looks like is a vital piece of pricing and marketing homes heading into the summer months.

So far in 2023, 66 homes have changed hands in the Belgrade Lakes Region, with 25 of those being waterfront homes. That is an overall decline of 30% from the number of sales in 2022, although waterfront property sales are equal to last year. Higher mortgage interest rates and lower inventory has led to the decline in year-round residential homes. We continue to see demand for waterfront properties. Because of this waterfront demand and tighter inventory, the median sales prices continue to rise.

\$504,000, a 30% increase from 2022 sales price. By comparison, the National Association of Realtors reported a decline of unit volume of 20%, while posting a modest increase of 1% for median sales prices in the Northeast US. Maine has been resilient to the price declines that are taking place nationally. Historically, Maine has lagged behind National and Northeast trends, so it is fair to predict that price increases will continue into the sum-

said Oakland Town Manager Ella Bowman. Plans for TIF funding realized from the district will be utilized to support infrastructure, business growth, facade improvements, marketing the downtown, expanding and improving area trail connections, and more. 


