

Memories of Camp Belgrade for Boys, North Belgrade, Maine, 1937-1976

Tane Eiseman Sharf and Jill Eiseman Witherell, twin daughters of Mort and Vera Eiseman, owners of the former Camp Belgrade on Great Pond, will be turning 80 years old this summer! Their families (children, grandchildren) will be celebrating the big day (July 23) in North Belgrade, where Jane and Richard Sharf have had a summer home on Great Pond for the past 40+ years.

Jane and Jill grew up at Camp Belgrade, and have deep ties to (and deep knowledge of) the area and its citizens.


amp Belgrade was founded in 1937 by Mort and Vera Eiseman who owned and ran the camp for the next 40 years. It was located on the site of the former girls' Camp Jo-Lee (which existed in the early 1900s). It covered approximately 150 acres from Route 8 down to Great Pond. It had two sandy beaches, docks and floats, tennis courts, a basketball court, baseball field, softball/soccer field, riflery range, nature hut with live animals, arts and crafts building, a council ring, and in the early days, a chemistry lab and a boxing ring. One of the larger buildings was a lodge where original plays were put on, movies shown, and camp dances held. Rows of

individual cabins (bunks) for approximately 150 boys were located along pathways lined with white rocks. A main building housed the dining room, kitchen, and dorm upstairs for support staff. The camp also had a shower house and onsite laundry. There were three canoe sheds holding Old Town canoes, a fleet of sturdy wooden row boats, sailboats, and a bath house for boys to change into swim suits at the larger beach and large cities and suburbs along the East Coast, water skiing at the smaller beach.

Campers were called to each activity and meals by the ringing of a large iron bell at The Well in front of the dining hall building, called the Mess Hall. At the end of the day, a camper player "Taps" on a bugle.

A live-in doctor and nurse were on duty at all times, at the infirmary building. In addition, the camp had a fulltime chef and baker in residence. In 1961 a fire destroyed the main building, which was rebuilt with the dormitory and shower house in a different location. The laundry was not rebuilt.

Campers, ages 8-15, came from most of the from Boston to Norfolk, VA, Pittsburgh, and north to Canada. Some campers also came from as far away as Chicago and other Mid-west cities. Campers were predominantly Jewish from upper middle class families. In the early days, campers Continued on page 2

arrived by a special camp train, which stopped at the old North Belgrade train station (now a church on Rte. 8 and Taylor Woods Rd.)

Each summer was a full 8-week session and included instruction in all land and water sports, as well as the option for camping trips varying from mountain climbing to week-long canoeing on the Allagash with a Maine Guide and other canoe trips, deep sea fishing, or trips by bus to Quebec City for older campers. During the last week of camp, competition between two teams (Beavers and Eagles) took place, called Fun Week. Large signs appeared, made by the campers, to announce various activities and games.

Counselors, who slept in the bunks with campers, often were teachers and coaches during the school year. College students, all over 21, were also hired. For several years, exchange students from England worked at the camp. All had experience in their sport and were trained to work with children. Many had been campers and "graduated" through the ranks to become counselors, going through the training program as Training-in-Counseloring (TICs) and Counselor Assistants (CAs), staying on for many summers. Camp Belgrade became an integral part of the lives of many families, often with second generation campers attending.

Each camper and counselor made his own plaque which was hung on the walls and rafters



of the Lodge building. A star was added for each year the person attended camp. In addition, an annual magazine called "The Sachem" was produced with articles about each activity, special events, trips, and information about campers and counselors in each bunk. Camp photos were taken yearly.

The Eisemans, who had a house on the campus, eventually sold the camp after the 1976 sea-





son to a former camper and his son, but that was not successful, and the camp closed for good in 1983. The property ultimately became the year-round community called Loon Cove.

Not only did the campers and counselors have a strong connection to Camp Belgrade and the area, but so do the current Eiseman family descendants. Mort and Vera's three grandsons attended the camp, and one of their twin daughters owns a summer home nearby on Great Pond within view of the old campsite.

Belgrade, Maine: A Postcard View

The Belgrade Historical Society will be sponsoring a presentation by ▲ Kevin Johnson, photo archivist for the Penobscot Marine Museum, "Belgrade, Maine: A Postcard View, Selections from the Eastern Illustrating & Publishing Company" on Tuesday July 25 at 6:30 pm at 7 Lakesalliance, 137 Main Street Belgrade Lakes Village

Johnson's slide show and talk will feature the story of the postcard company, as well as historic views of Belgrade. The glass plate negative collection of Lawrence Sturtevant of Belgrade was donated to the museum and includes hundreds of pictures of Belgrade camps as well as scenes of Belgrade.

Postcards were the instagrams of the times and Eastern Illustrating & Publishing was America's largest manufacturer of glass plate photograph postcards. The Company was founded in 1909 in Belfast by Rudolph Herman Cassens. Cashing in on the era's booming popularity of postcards, Cassens' goal was to photograph small towns and rural areas from Maine to California producing "real photo" postcards to promote tourism. The company produced more than 50,000 glass plate negatives of New England and upstate New York between 1909 and 1947. The col-



lection is now part of the archives of the Penobscot Marine Museum.




Take It Outside —

Counting Loons


The third Saturday in July is the annual loon count in Maine, coordinated by Maine Audubon. See: (https://www.maineaudubon.org/projects/loons/annual-loon-count/). This year's count took place July 15th and was the 40th annual count in this important ongoing citizen-science project dedicated to better understanding one of Maine's most iconic birds. Every year over 1000 volunteers, of which I am one, attempt to count all the loons on over 300 Maine lakes at the same time. It's organized like a military operation, and I am the coordinator for the dozen or so volunteers on Long Pond, which is divided into 9 Survey Areas, with a 10th on Ingham Pond. Scott Chapman is my deputy coordinator for Lower Long Pond. Early in the morning, all counters head for their assigned section of the lake to be in position to count all the adult loons and loon chicks in their area between 7:00 AM and 7:30 AM. It was pouring rain with thunder when I awoke about 5 AM and turned on my phone to find a text from one of my neighbors who had waited until then to print off his map and discovered his printer was out of ink. I printed a

map off for him and finished breakfast, as the rain stopped and the wind died down just in time for the count. I delivered the map and left my dock around 6:15 AM, to pick up my counting partner, Fred Knight, at his dock on the way to our Survey Area. I spoke to my neighbors, Jason and Sarah Toner, who were on their way to pick up Rose Talbot to count the loons in Beaver Cove. Rose is in her mid-nineties and has been counting the loons in her cove for decades. Our youngest counter this year was 9-year-old Emilia Selover, who was on her first loon count, helping her dad and grandfather count their sector. There was a low overcast but with practically no wind, almost perfect conditions for spotting loons.

Our assigned area was a cove that has been used for many years by a pair of loons that typically nests on a secluded beach on a small peninsula. Recently, this pair had been unsuccessful in raising very many chicks because land-based and avian predators found the nest and ate the loon

eggs before they hatched. Four years ago, the Belgrade Lakes Association (BLA), as part of their ongoing study of loons on Great and Long Pond (more information in Dick Greenan's loon articles), built and installed a floating raft nest with an avian guard (to prevent predation by eagles, ravens, and blue herons). The nest was moored about 20-feet offshore from the usual nesting site to provide the loons some

protection from terrestrial predators such as racoons, minks, et al. When land-based predators have to cross water to reach the nest, the defensive advantage shifts strongly in the loons favor! For the past three years, the loons successfully used this nest but for some reason, were not successful this year. As Fred and I searched the cove, we spotted Mike Brown, of Corinth, fishing and swung by to see how he was doing. He had just finished landing a 14-pound pike on a large (~8") lure called "Little Rainbow Trout." We took his picture and searched the area around the nest with no success. We started back up the far shore towards the north end of our sector when

suddenly a loon flew overhead and appeared to land back by the nest. We reversed course and suddenly another loon landed right in front of the boat and started calling her mate. We soon had both loons nearby in time to be counted. As of press time, I had not received results from all of

my counters but it appears likely that both adult and chick numbers are comparable to last year (2022 Long Pond, including Ingham: 38 adults, 3 chicks). As of last week, at least 6



Bike the Shores of Merrymeeting Bay to Open Farms and Studios

Merrymeeting Bay Bike Tour designed for visiting farms and exploring the scenes of Open Farm Day. The tour will offer a 12-mile route or a 25-mile route and may include a half dozen farms, over a dozen studios and several related stops - a community garden, a food pantry, a park on the bay.

The ride will leave from Mailly Waterfront Park at 10 am and follow the shores of Merrymeeting Bay to Richmond's waterfront park, visiting two farms along the way: Stonecipher Farm - a small organic mixed vegetable and fruit farm which uses "no-till" principles and Six River Farm - a certified organic vegetable farm located on the shores of Merrymeeting Bay. There is a turn-back option at the second farm for the 12-mile ride.

Those who continue will visit one of Bowdoin's newest farms and finish by visiting a diversified livestock farm. Or, cyclists can create their own rides and explore the farms and studios (there is a list at www.bowdoinham.com/page/2023-open-farm-studio-day with links to the two routes) at their own pace, explore the Bay and learn about Merrymeeting Trail.













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


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
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
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Call of the Loon



There is Never a Dull Moment

We are approaching the finish line of this years' Loon breeding season and I guess all is going as well as can be expected. There has been the typical loon activities with parents abandoning their second egg, intruders coming into their breeding territories in an attempt to take over,

altercations with eagles, turtles and raccoons, just to name a few of their predators. A typical week in the life of our loons! UGH!!

But despite the aforementioned, we still have seven chicks on Long Pond but just two on all of Great Pond although we still have two nests in the works with a potential of four more chicks. Pending a

surprise or two, Long Pond is done for the season. Although it is a little late for loons to renest or to nest for that matter, there are usually one or two surprises every season in the way of new nests that we were not aware of. Let's keep our fingers crossed but

with the young eyes of our Colby interns, a surprise nest popping up is unlikely!

We had an interesting observation in lower Long Pond yesterday with Lee and our two Colby interns where we came across a raft of four loons in a territory that just produced a chick. The presence of a chick of course is great news but not with what looked like two adult loons coming into

the territory to cause trouble. In this 'fleet' of four loons we observed two hanging back and under further observation, discovered our breeding pair with their new jewelry (ie. bands) so we know that they came out to intercept the two intruders but what happened to the week-old chick? Under such threats, the parents will often stash the chick(s) along the shoreline and sure enough, Lee discovered what looked like a little fuzz ball up against the shore 200 yds. away that was the chick.

Under further observation over a twenty-minute period, we could see our banded pair constantly looking over in the chick's direction to make sure everything was still good while escorting the intruders out and on their way! There is literally never a dull moment in the life of a loon.

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
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

The Dams Keeper Report

What a roller coaster of a week it's been for your Dams Committee! With daily forecasts of scattered thunderstorms and the potential for heavy rain, we ended up with just .44" of precipitation for the past ten days. How are we expected to maintain full ponds with such forecasts, when our neighbors up north in Jay, received 6" of rain in just a few hours with a similar forecast? Six inches of rain would have brought up Long Pond a whopping 18"! I guess that is why they pay us the big bucks!! We wish! In reality, we're all volunteers and donate our time and blood because, like you, we care about our lakes.

So what would you do if you just received this weather alert from Kennebec County Emergency Management Agency within the past hour: "A Series of systems will bring a more widespread threat for showers and thunderstorms with embedded heavy rainfall and increasing flooding threat through the weekend"? Would you open all of the gates to make room for the pending doom, or toss the dice, take your chances and leave all of the dams at their pretty much full

pond for the summer visitors, with a serious potential of flooding out our streams, roads, loon nests, docks? We try to rely on some science here but it's not easy and you're damned if you do and damned if you don't – no pun intended! But we do have our hands on the switch in the event that we do get Armageddon!


For the time being, the Village spillway dam is presently at 2.76" above full pond with one gate opened just one foot. Long Pond, at the Wings Mill Dam, is 2.28" below full with both gates at 20" and 24" respectively with upper Long Pond exactly at full pond. Snow Pond is at 5.16" below full probably to make some room for the impending doom! Salmon and McGrath are in great shape right at full pond with the 1 cfs. calibrated valve still opened 15 turns.

Recommendations to Prevent Ongoing Algal Blooms at North Pond Will be Presented at a Public Meeting on July 24th at Pine Tree Camp



Watershed residents and business owners on and around North Pond are invited to attend a public meeting to learn more about the preliminary results of a two-year study to determine why North Pond has been turning green every summer since 2018, and what actions are needed to restore water quality. The meeting will be held at Pine Tree Camp at 114 Pine Tree Camp Road in Rome on July 24th from 6:30-8:30pm. The meeting will be accessible through Zoom as well for anyone unable to attend in person.

The meeting will include a panel of scientists and watershed managers that have been collaborating on the project since early 2022 including Dr. Danielle Wain and Charlie Baeder from 7 Lakes Alliance, Jennifer Jespersen from Ecological Instincts, and Dr. Ken Wagner of Water Resource Services. There will be 30 minutes set aside at the end of the meeting for attendees to ask questions about the recommendations and to provide input on the 10-year Watershed-Based Management Plan that will be released later this year. Recommendations will focus on actions that can be taken to reduce the amount of phosphorus in the lake in order to prevent algal blooms from returning. Management considerations will focus on addressing runoff from watershed sources such as roads, driveways, and camps as well as addressing phosphorus in the lake sediments.

Seaweed Chronicles by Susan Hand Shetterly

• She writes so very particularly about nature and so very poetically that the pages turn and memories surface of what I have observed in our

beautiful state of Maine. This book describes our Gulf of Maine, "A World at the Water's Edge."

"Out of water, the seaweed looks like a pale purple scrunch of Saran warp lying in the sun." I saw this at Higgins Beach near Portland more than once at low tide. I bet many of you beach goers have seen this shiny site, almost reaching to pick up a piece of Saran warp.

When Susan Hand Shetterly mentions a woman scientist from Wales who was honored on the beaches of Japan for her life long studies of seaweed, I notice. How fascinating to have seaweed world lessons that can be applied to our rich coastal waters. The author also goes into the ages of ice and eons of centuries when those mammoth boulders were shoved. "[T]he Gulf of Maine was born, with deep troughs from the ancient fire and the high, cobbled hills made by ice."

Kathleen Drew-Baker from the U.K. collected seaweed and now sushi is wrapped in it, famous food from Japan. Do you ever enjoy rice balls or soups seasoned by seaweed? Taxes were paid in Japan to the emperor long ago with nori, valuable seaweed used as cash by the peasants.

The British Phycological Society recognized Kathleen's seaweed discoveries before she died in 1957. "Here on the Maine coast, the coves (like Higgins Beach) where laver predominates are mostly found along cobbled Downeast shores, where the tides pull away and the mussel beds...are exposed together." Memories from this author's "Settled in the Wild" pop up as she dug for fresh mussels for meals almost daily.

Living on our land without spoiling it is a theme in both of Shetterly's nature books. She quotes Aldo Leopoldo: "Our tools are better than we are, and grow faster than we do. They suffice to crack the atom, to command





Cettled in the Wild" was reviewed by me in Summertime awhile ago. the tides, but they do not suffice for the oldest task in human history, to live on a piece of land without spoiling it."

Whales were almost destroyed by modern forms of whaling. Dr.

Stephen Katona of Bar Harbor's College of the Atlantic was interviewed about modern whaling carnage as compared to Moby Dick times. So too, harvesting of seaweed. "The third method, used primarily in Midcoast Maine, is the mechanical harvester: a flat-bottomed boat with a rotary cutting head and a suction hose that pulls over the cut weed and spews it into netted bags."

Nova Scotia had destructive seaweed cutting years ago that has been outlawed. Our Maine Seaweed Council preserves and protects the rich seaweed along our Gulf of Maine fertile shores. I can almost smell that salty air and taste the seaweed flavor enhancers.


"To work in beauty is a gift...it's a human birthright of sorts, working where the sun rises, the day clears, the smells of the wild world are all around you, and you are a







