The Awesome Life of the Access User



oats parked in driveways, fishing gear stowed in cars, kayaks on a vehicle roof and floatees packed in picnic baskets. They're all part of the life of Maine lake access users, residents who don't own lakefront proper-Maine's waters are so accessible.

According to state studies: "well over 200,000 Maine adults are access users on lakes annually. About 78% swim, 64% recreate near the shore, 49% fish from a boat and roughly 40% use powerboats and canoes. Maine resident access users spend as much as \$153 million annually on their recreation, 59% of which is spent in the communities nearest those lakes. This use supports as

many as 3,000 jobs (lake use in general supports more than 8000 Maine jobs) and generates in excess of \$30 million income for Maine residents."


There are no statistics for the remarkable value ty but participate in the unique privilege that in lifestyle enjoyment and life enrichment of access users nor statistics about youth access users who follow in their adults' footsteps but state studies have found that access users place substantial value, in excess of the cost to them, on the lakes they use for swimming, boating, fishing, etc.

> Studies aside, access use of the Belgrade lakes and surrounding watersheds appears significant and everyone who passes area parks with their

inviting picnic tables, drives these roads with their priceless water views, stops at mini-markets crowded with day users refueling their vehicles, boats and themselves recognizes that the culture of the access user is a familiar part of lake life in Maine. Almost all the lakes and ponds have boat launches, most of the towns have lake access and there an abundance of parks of all sizes where users are welcome.

Although access commonly brings to mind public boat landings, everyone who lives among the lakes can be aware of anglers casting off the side of the road, of cars parked near where almost obscure word-of-mouth trails lead to

Charing the roads... Maine's roads are public ways and • horse-drawn carriages and wagons using them are protected by law. Motorists are required to stop when requested to by the horse's attendant and wait until given the go-ahead, especially if the animal is disturbed.

Other laws include: don't use vehicle horns around animals; don't rev engines; turn off high beams; and, when passing, allow a 3-feet clearance (more is better). In a recent incident, a passing vehicle pulled the back left wheel off an Amish horsedrawn wagon; much worse accidents have happened.

Remember, the roads are shared with our Amish neighbors.

m veryone}$ loves a good parade, especially a good boat parade and one of the best is coming up on Thursday, July 4 in Belgrade Lakes.

If the past is any indication, there will be family (pontoon) and party boats, speed boats, maybe a fire boat, angler boats, rubber boats, boats piloted by dogs (or so it seems), paddle boats, the occasional canoe or kayak and the spectators' favorites - antique boats, with antique motors.

It's no accident that so many antique boats are in the parade. Many of them are owned and coveted by residents of Great Pond and have plied these waters for years.


Others are Great Pond guests for the day, the passion of a unique group of collectors who are statewide members of the Pine Tree Boating Club, the local branch of the national Antique Outboard Motor Club, Inc. (AOMCI).

Throughout the boating months, when the call goes out, the members show up on a variety of lakes in Maine. There's a code for when and where and a few simple instructions, mostly like bring your own food.

For the Belgrade Lakes 4th of July Boat Parade, the code is Pete's Place. Pete's is a rallying point starting at 4 am. At 10 am the floating antique collection heads to the parade line-up at the mouth of the Belgrade Stream and from then on its 2 miles of pure participation enjoyment past historic boat houses, lily pads and kids wading on the edge of the steam.

Local docks that have been offered as public viewing sites will be crowded with spectators. Local ducks who own the stream will paddle helterskelter. Cameras will click. And, the occasional water gun will add an element of friendly fire suspense.

week and confirmed that what people thought might be pine pollen on many the year. shorelines was actually cyanobacteria (also known as blue green algae). This type of cyanobacteria is called Dolichospermum and has the potential to produce algal toxins. It is typically seen much later in the summer. While testing done by 7 Lakes in the past has yet to detect algal toxins in our lakes, we always caution to stay out of the water with blue green algae, particularly chilmostly present on the shorelines where it accumulates, driven by the wind, so open waters tend to be clearer for recreation. Cooler temperatures and rain, predicted to follow the recent hot weather will help dissipate the scums in most locations until warmer weather arrives.

• Dolichospermum spends the beginning of its life cycle in the lake sediments, where it finds phosphorus needed to grow. When the weather gets

Tn the wake of recent extreme temperatures, many concerned citizens are warmer, it leaves the sediment and enters the water. While it is known to cause reporting green scum on their shorelines, particularly on North Pond, Great full lake algal blooms on North Pond, it has also been present in the past on Pond and Long Pond. 7 Lakes Alliance's Dr. Danielle Wain tested samples this Great Pond and Long Pond, but not in quantities to produce scums this early in




Card #3: View from inside narrows of Mill Stream, facing Westerly. The Pulsifer boathouse is center and the big white house and barn were Maggie and Deke Damren's which burned about 20 years ago. The LRC building now sits on that site. The small boathouse on the far right belongs to the Tripp family and is one of only a few that still exist today. The Pulsifer home is the tiny white peak in center peeking over the boathouse and is still lived in by Bill Pulsifer and his daughter Louise. The card was sent on November 12, 1907, addressed to Maude L. Watts in Rogue Bluffs, Maine. The stamp was 1 cent.



Card #4: View (I'm quite sure) is looking Northerly into Mill Stream, before any buildings were built. The hill in the background is likely Bogart's Mountain and the watercraft is an early launch. The card was sent to New Sharon, Maine on January 3, 1912, again, for 1 cent.

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Augusta 4th Celebrations Offer Orchestra Option

Againly-friendly party will take place at Mill Park. A parade will start at the State Capitol. Fireworks will be displayed over the Kennebec River. The Augusta Symphony Orchestra will hold its first Capital Fourth Celebration at the Augusta Civic Center. And the scenic, historic Kennebec River provides the setting.

The all-day 2024 Augusta 4th of July schedule will run from 8:45 am to 9:45 pm and is filled with activities, performances, music and food.

Starting after 8 am, the Downeast Brass is performing at Market Square. The parade, from the Capitol to Old Fort Western, begins at 10 am. The theme this year is "Hometown Heroes." At noon at Old Fort Western the Mayor of Augusta will read the Declaration of Independence. There will be other activities at Old Fort Western, including a Chicken BBQ hosted by the Calumet Club.

Following the parade a schedule of activities will be offered at Mill Park. Food trucks will be available from 1 to 9 pm, for children there will be a bounce house, a magician and a variety of games, and there will be musical performances until fireworks at 9 pm where the best viewing is from Mill Park.

.....From 3 to 5 pm everyone is invited to join the Augusta Symphony Orchestra for their first Maine Capital Fourth Event held at the Augusta Civic Center. There will be full concessions available with activities, an instrument petting zoo and small ensembles playing leading up to the concert. The concert will feature traditional holiday music, marches and pops medleys.

The 50-member Augusta Symphony Orchestra has existed in some form since 1920 and today serves as an educational and charitable organization to the surrounding area. Under Music Director and Conductor, Jinwook Park, the orchestra performs free, live classical music for the Augusta community four times a year.

At the Civic Center there is plenty of free parking, the building is air-conditioned and admission is free. The performance is rain or shine.















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
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






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
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

"ve said it before but these loons Lare still driving me crazy! We figured with the early ice out that we would have an early "Chicks In" but such was and is not the case! As of this writing, Long Pond can lay claim to this year's first chick but that's it so far for

Long. The season's first Great Pond hatch was a 'double' and with another single hatch, Great Pond now has three chicks for a grand total of four between the two ponds.

So, along with this great news, we also had our first of many abandoned eggs on Long Pond's Blueberry Island. Our pair nested with just the one egg but abandoned it two weeks later. Why? Our best guess is a result of territorial pressure from an intruder wanting to take over this prime

loon real estate. This egg, like all abandoned eggs, will end up going down to BioDiversity Research Institute in Portland for heavy metals, etc. testing this fall. Until then, it goes into Sue's freezer!

Those of you that frequent the Great Pond Marina and Sadie's Restaurant are of course used to seeing loons in the Marina area and those with keen eyesight have even observed a loon nesting in the adjacent wetlands. But seeing multiple loons in

With an average five adult loons in that 'cove' this year, the mating pair has been distracted to say the least and have yet to nest. There's still time but the clock is running out! Our two Colby interns along with our other valued volunteers visit that territory, as they do the other twenty-six or so loon territories on Great and Long Ponds, every two or three days so we are keeping our fingers crossed for things to settle down and let the band-

As of this writing, both Great and Long Ponds each have seven nests in progress which isn't bad but it's not great either. That's only fourteen nests out of a potential twentysix. Of course, we are shooting for the moon and would love to see twenty-six nests but of course, that's not reality. We only had nine chicks between the two lakes last year with

only one, or possibly two, making it to the Great Fly-Off in late October and November.



Hummingbirds bop around fast from flower to flower in California and Maine. Sometimes I only hear their buzzing tiny wings and maybe see their shadow as they dart from bloom to bloom quickly and are gone.

The Dams Keeper Report

Your thirteen volunteers on the Inter-local Belgrade Area Dams Committee have been vigilant in keeping the ponds around three inches above full pond (ie. the water going over the spillways/walkways is ankle deep), because we still don't know if we are going to have some level of drought this summer so we are taking the conservative approach. For the past 10 days we had 1.07" of precipitation and Weather Underground is forecasting another 2.11 for the next 10 days so all looks good and very normal so far. July's normal for this region is 3.43", 3.25" for August, 3.60" for



September and so forth.

With this past week's heat, both Great and Long Ponds lost about 3/10" per day and in doing some research, these are actually normal evaporation rates. An interesting article by C.E. Grunsky entitled "Evaporation from lakes and reservoirs" going back to September 1931 suggests that the evaporation rate with an ambient outside temperature of 85F is approximately 3/10" per day. And if that wasn't enough, about 80% of our camps still use lake water and in addition to the slight seepage from our dams you can see why we are trying to keep the lakes at 3" above full for a little wiggle room!

As of this writing, Great Pond's Village dam is currently 3.24" above full pond with both gates completely closed. Long Pond's Wings Mill dam is right at 3.0", also above full pond with both gates also closed. Salmon/McGrath is 2.28" above full with its single gate also closed but with its calibrated valve set to the mandated 1 cfs. flow. Our neighbors on Messalonskee are down 4.8" below full due to Oakland's electricity genera-

tion needs, which is understandable with the AC units set to maximum!

These afternoon showers are just what is needed for our farmers, gardens, wells as well as our lake levels so I guess we really shouldn't complain about a shower here or there!


