
aybe it's time to take that growing pile of paperwork and sort through it under the calming quiet of a huge pine tree...with a wastebasket brought along for good measure.



7 Lakes Alliance Announces \$1 Million Land for Lakes Summer Appeal: Conserving Land is the #1 Way to Protect our Lakes!

Recognizing that conserved land plays a vital role in protecting our entire watershed, 7 Lakes Alliance is working to conserve 7,000 additional acres by 2030. This will hopefully include conservation-minded land owners who donate both land and conservation easements that will be forever protected. 7 Lakes is also actively seeking grant funding from both public and private funders to support our land program.

Currently, 20% of the Belgrade Lakes region is conserved. In line with widely accepted conservation science, 7 Lakes has established a goal of safeguarding 30% of the region. This is also in support of the National and State of Maine 30 by 30 Conservation Initiative. This goal is supported by many scientific studies demonstrating compelling benefits, such as enhanced water quality, climate resilience, wildlife protection and the opportunity for low-impact recreation that fosters well-being in our community.

In the Belgrade Lakes watershed, conserved land lets Mother Nature do what she does best: absorb and filter runoff before it reaches our lakes. Conserved land is 10 times more protective of water quality than developed land. 7 Lakes Alliance considers many important criteria in evaluating land for conservation, but water quality protection is the most important consideration. Although shorefront land plays an incredibly important role in protecting our lakes, upland forests and wetlands are also effective in protecting water quality.

Dr. Christopher Monz, President and CEO of 7 Lakes noted that "protecting forested land is the most cost effective means to preserve our watershed. Alum treatments, like the one 7 Lakes successfully did on East Pond and is planning for North Pond, are part of the solution but need to be a last resort, especially given the very high cost."

7 Lakes is establishing a \$1 million revolving land fund that can be used opportunistically to purchase land that meets the highest and most compelling land conservation criteria to protect the Belgrade Lakes watershed. Memories and Tidbits from the Belgrade Historical Society

Who remembers the Association Docks? It is likely that none of us do, other than in this historic photo. We do not know the exact year that these docks finally petered out and rotted away, but, there are several of us alive that know these docks were gone from the shore of Mill Stream in Belgrade Lakes by the 1940s.

The docks housed a fleet of guide boats operated by local guides. During the summer season, as many as fifty guides kept busy with fishing sports from near and far. The entire Belgrade Chain of Lakes were abundant with fish — and the accommodations such as The Belgrade Hotel, The Lakeshore, The Locust House, The Messalonskee Lodge and many others, were built and available for both short and long term seasonal housing.

Early in the first half of the twentieth century, wooden boat building blos-

somed as the demand for special fishing boats increased significantly. As seen in the photo below right, "double-enders" (pointed on both ends) from 18-21 feet long, required long docks in a protected area in the event of storms. In addition to dockage for the boats, the docks and general area became the meeting place each morning for Guides, Sports and yes, even the Baitman! The path to reach the docks was between Sybill's Store (think Maine Made Shop) and Maggie's Barn (LRC Property, barn burned 25 years ago).

The location of these docks was (ironically), precisely where the 7 Lakes Alliance public docks are today. The large boathouse that is shown was owned by the Pulsifer family after 1928, and the property still is today! Like a flash in the pan, a half a century later, guideboats, guides, and baitmen are few and far between.







Waterville Creates
Opens Light Sentinels
by Skunk Control,
Public Art in
Castonguay Square



Waterville Creates is pleased to announce the opening of a new temporary public art installation in Waterville's Castonguay Square: Light Sentinels by Australian creative team Skunk Control, officially opened Friday, July 12.

The project consists of 10 towering (16–20 feet) kinetic flower-inspired sculptures. These sculptures captivate viewers by dynamically unfurling and closing their petals, projecting vibrant and continually evolving colored light shadows over the surrounding landscape. Skunk Control is the 2024 award recipient for Waterville Creates' Call for Proposals (CFP) Temporary Public Art.

"We're delighted to be working with Waterville Creates to engage the Waterville community with our kinetic Light Sentinels, making their U.S. debut," said Australian artist Nick Athanasiou of


Skunk Control. "We hope that the Light Sentinels provide the Waterville community with opportunities for delightful discovery."

Light Sentinels will be on view in Castonguay Square in downtown Waterville beginning July 12 and remain in place through November. The project was initially slated to open June 7 but international shipping delays necessitated a month's postponement, though Athanasiou did join Waterville Creates from Australia in June to lead a series of community programs, exploring, in his words, "the artistry, science, and wonder of nature and light," delighting participants with mini-Light Sentinel construction and pyrotechnics.

After the delay, Waterville Creates is excited to finally share the Light Sentinels with the community. The new opening date corresponds with the kick-off of both the 27th Maine International Film Festival and the 2024 Waterville Rocks free concert series. Those queueing up at MIFF's entry tent for access to screenings at the Maine Film Center or Waterville Opera House will enjoy a perfect vantage point for the Light Sentinels.

Visiting again from Australia, Athanasiou will join the Thursday, July 11 edition of the free, weekly Art in the Park program series in Castonguay Square 3–5pm, presented by Waterville Creates in partnership with the Waterville Public Library and Colby College Museum of Art. Athanasiou will guide participants in creating their own moth sculptures inspired by the Light Sentinels. Athanasiou will also be present in Castonguay Square Friday, July 12, to meet with visitors and speak about the project.





We are approaching the finish line of this years' Loon breeding season and many of us are already looking forward to next year! This year has been terrible from a productivity standpoint! There has been far more parents abandoning both eggs and, in a few cases, just their second egg. We've been able to assign human interference to at least two of these abandoned nests but not all of them.

We are giving pair fidelity a closer look as a contributing factor. For example, we had the same banded pair successfully reproducing in Long Pond's Beaver Cove for four years straight. Two years ago, the banded female got kicked out by an intruding female as what happened again this season. As a result, a historically great producing territory has gone dry for two years in a row. Not a good sign.

We're seeing this in parts of our country aren't we with unwelcomed squatters! A question worth pondering is what happens to that chick born on Great Pond's Marina territory in

2021 that's now trying to come 'Home' after spending their juvenile three to four years on the ocean? They want to come back to their prenatal cove only to be seen now as an intruding threat! Some Home Welcoming!! As a chick has to be at least 8-9 lbs. in order to be banded, we just have not been able to track the chick to juvenile to adult.

Intruders feeling their oats and coming into a breeding territory in an attempt to take over are now predators along with eagles, turtles and raccoons, just to name a few. A typical week in the life of our loons! UGH!!

But despite the aforementioned, we do have four chicks on Great Pond but just one on all of Long Pond. We still have two nests in the works with a potential of four more chicks on Great Pond if Mother

Nature can only cooperate for a change. Pending a surprise or two, Long Pond is done for the season. Although it is a little late for loons to renest or to nest for that matter, there are usually one or two surprises every season in the

way of new nests that we were not aware of. Let's keep our fingers crossed. The young eyes of our two Colby interns did turn up a surprise nest yesterday on Lower Long Pond but it remains to be seen if our pair actually lay the egg (or two)! Good going, Jodie and Barlow! Thank you from all of us!

He is so very creative in making metal bookends for two special friends and seeing the GOOD in the woman out of prison.

'n 2001, while driving through the picturesque Belgrade Lakes area, Mary Lwas captivated by an old farm property. Initially serving as a residence in a charming Victorian farmhouse rather than an active farm, Mary felt an instant connection. With daily forecasts of scattered thunderstorms and the effects from tropical storm Beryl, we ended up with 2.33" of precipitation for the past ten days although it feels like more. We are still in our water conservation mode but are being challenged by these afternoon toad chockers! I guess that is why they pay us the big bucks!! We wish! In reality, we're all volunteers and donate our time and blood in some cases, because, like you, we care about our lakes.

So, what would you do if you just received this weather alert from Kennebec County Emergency Management Agency within the past hour: "Showers and thunderstorms will have the potential to produce gusty winds and locally heavy downpours through this evening...particularly from the foothills north"?

Would you open all of the gates to make room for the impending doom, or toss the dice, take your chances and leave all of the dams at their pretty much three inches above full pond for the summer visitors, with a serious potential of flooding out our streams, roads, loon nests, docks? We try to rely on some science here but it's not easy and you're damned if you do and damned if you don't – no pun intended! But we do have our hands on the switch in the event that we do get Armageddon!

For the time being, as this column is penned about a week before publication, the Village spillway dam is presently at 3.33" above full pond with one gate still opened just the one foot to keep the flow in Mill Stream. Long Pond, at the Wings Mill Dam, is today 4.07" above full with Gate One opened 30". Upper Long Pond, nine miles above the Wings Mill Dam has been more affected by the deluges at 4.29". Snow Pond is at 3.66" below in order to make room for the water we're sending its way. Salmon and McGrath are still in great shape right at 1.29" above full pond with the 1 cfs. calibrated valve still opened 15 turns.


